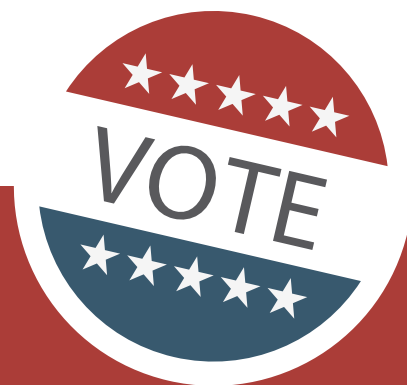

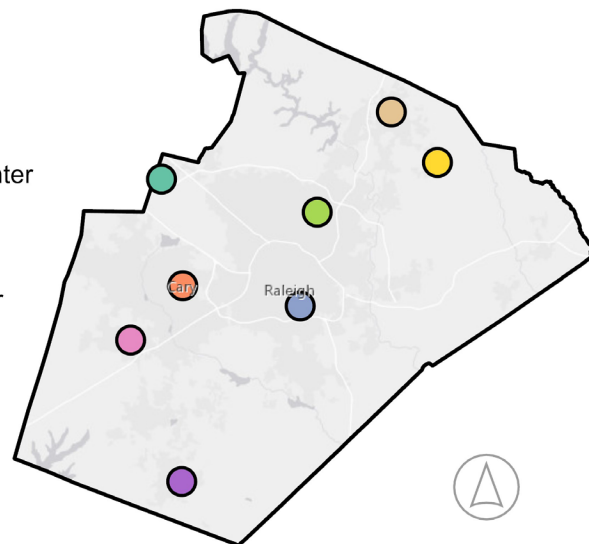

Rules Regarding Media Access

Interview and Photography/Video Rules

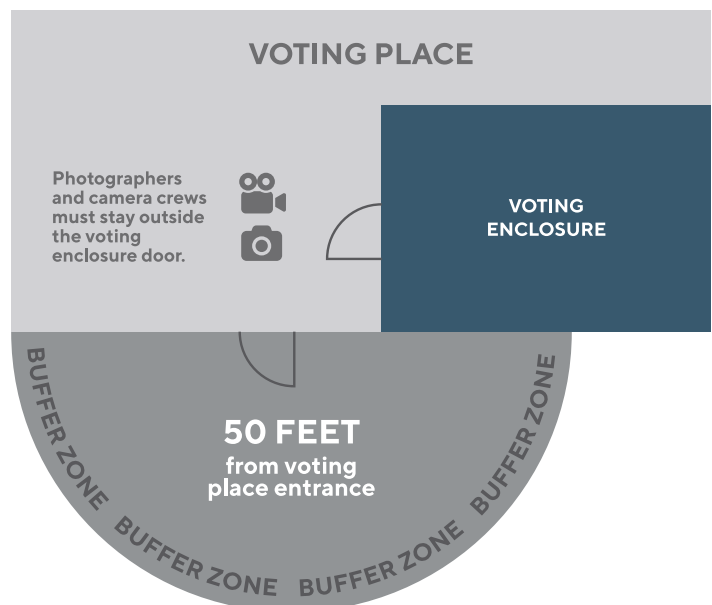
North Carolina General Statute 163-166.4. limits activity within the electioneering buffer zone that may “hinder access, harass others...” These 50-foot buffer zones are marked at polling places and early voting locations, are clearly noticeable, and apply to members of the public and the media.

Also, North Carolina General Statute 163-166.3. limits media access in the voting enclosure as follows:

(b) Photographing Voters Prohibited. - No person shall photograph, videotape, or otherwise record the image of any voter within the voting enclosure, except with the permission of both the voter and the chief judge of the precinct. If the voter is a candidate, only the permission of the voter is required. This subsection shall also apply to early voting sites under G.S. 163-166.40., 163-166.45., and 163-166.35. This subsection does not apply to cameras used as a regular part of the security of the facility that is a voting place or early voting site.

(c) Photographing Voted Ballot Prohibited. - No person shall photograph, videotape, or otherwise record the image of a voted official ballot for any purpose not otherwise permitted under law.

- Members of the media must conduct media polls and interviews outside the buffer zone.
- Members of the media must identify themselves to the Chief Judge when entering the buffer zone.
- Photographing voters is restricted. No person (including media, other voters or parents) shall photograph, videotape or otherwise record the image of any voter within the voting enclosure, except with the permission of both the voter and the Chief Judge of the precinct. If a candidate is in the act of voting in his/her precinct, only the permission of the candidate is required.
- With the cooperation of the Chief Judge, members of the media may take a panoramic photograph or video of the voting place but are not permitted to use a zoom lens that could show the individual voter in the process of voting.
- Members of the media should be positioned so that they will not obstruct or disrupt the voting process.
- After the polls close and all voters have left the enclosure, the media and public are allowed inside the enclosure but may not hinder the operations of the precinct officials.

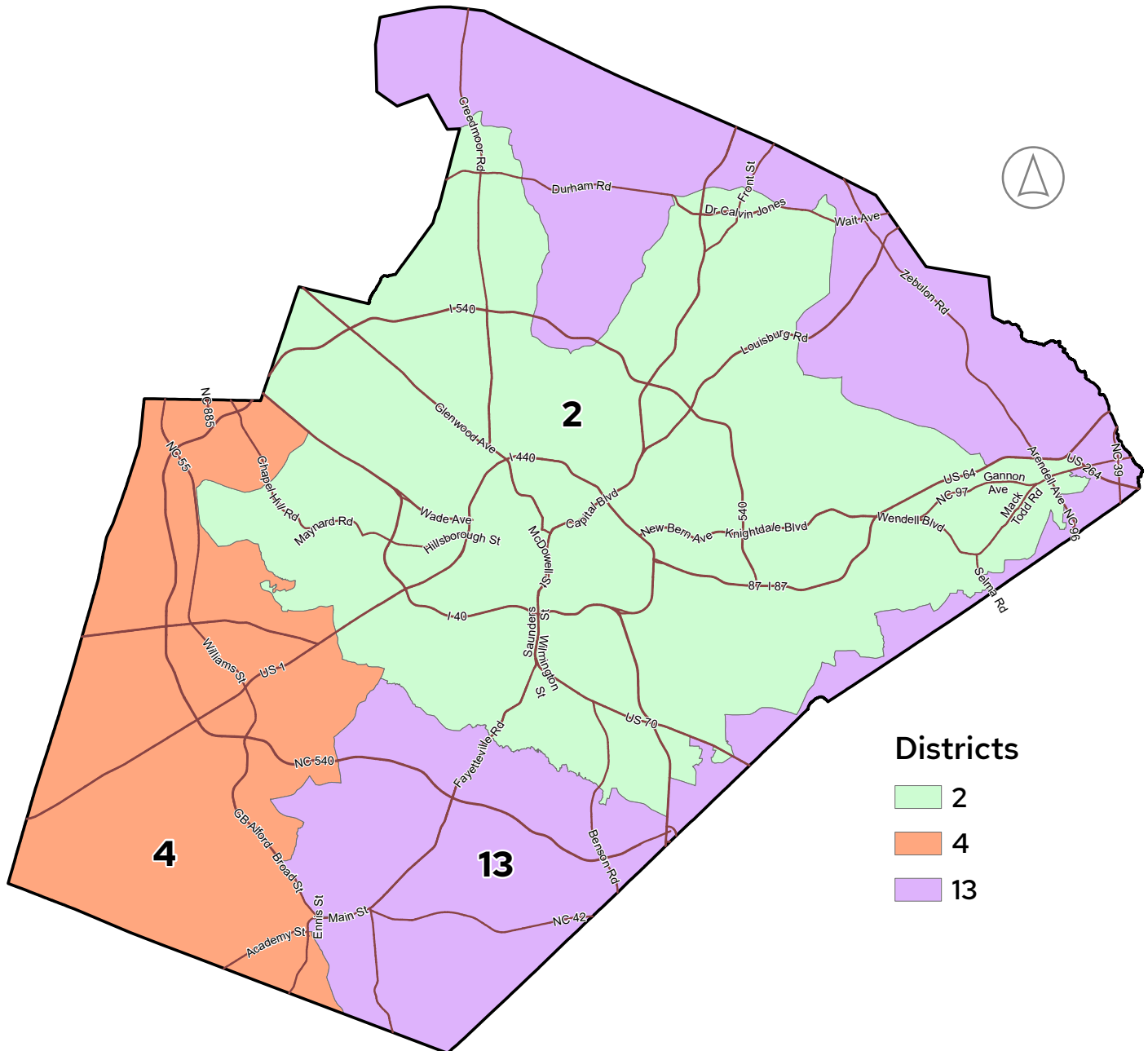

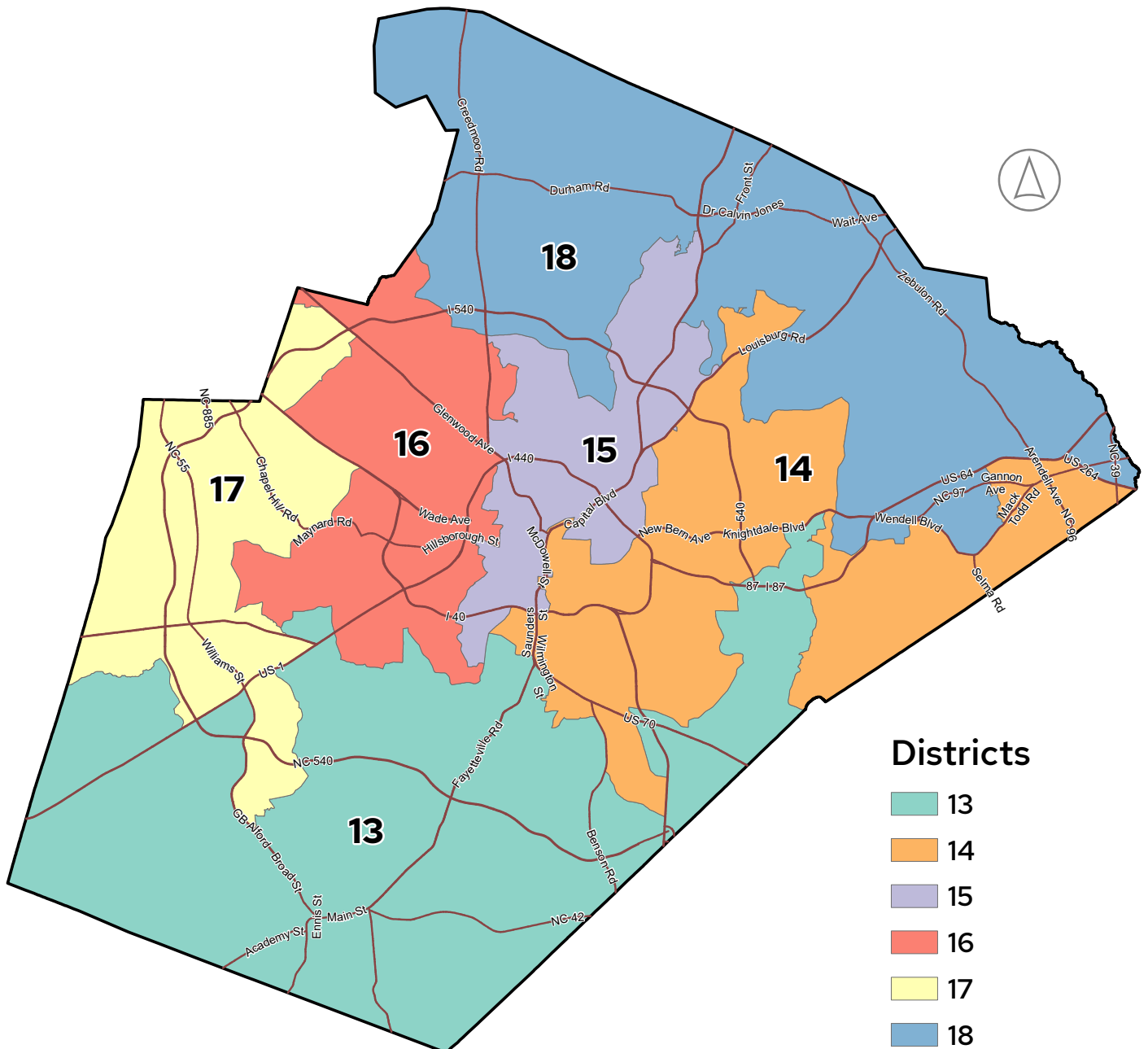

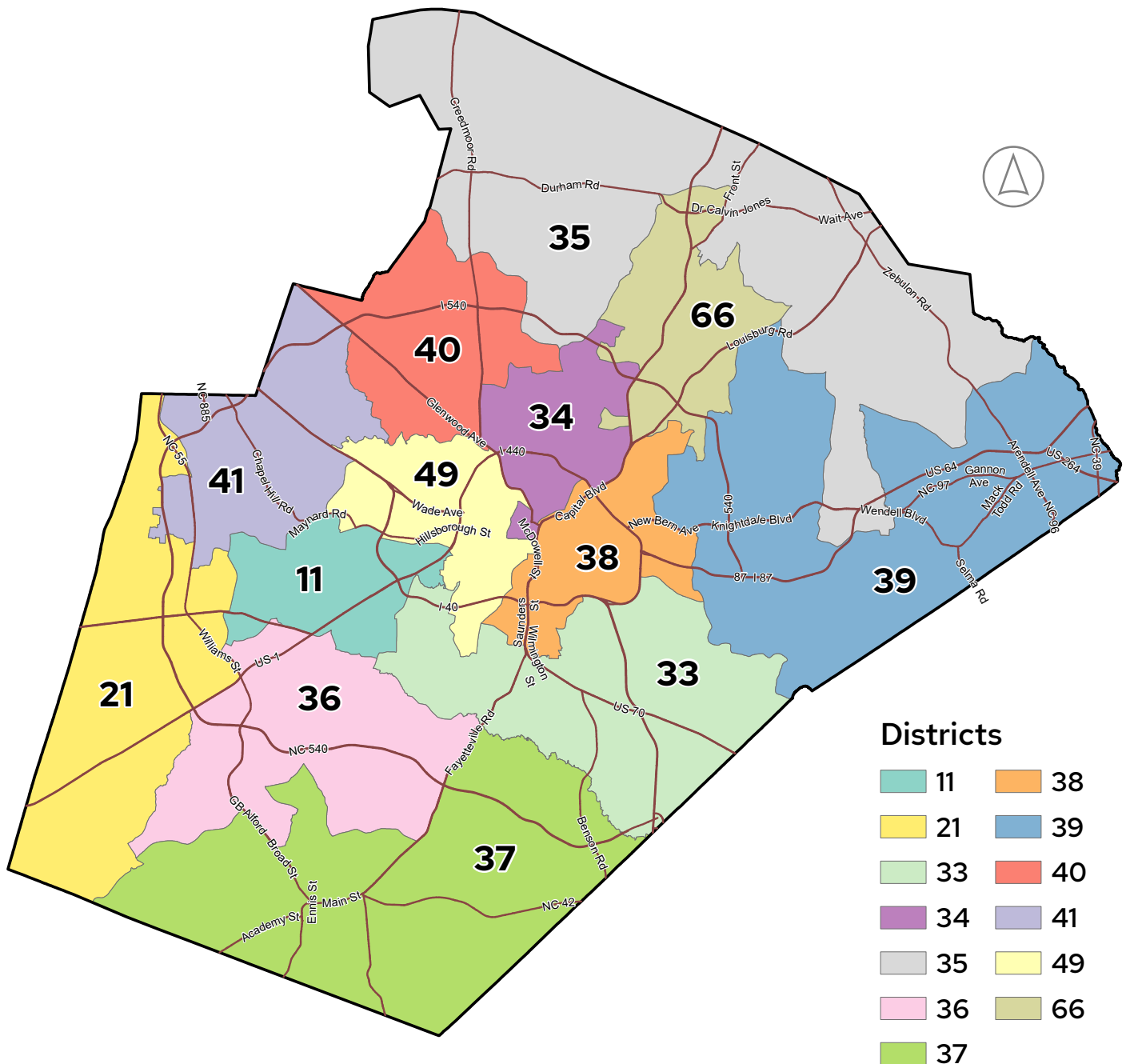

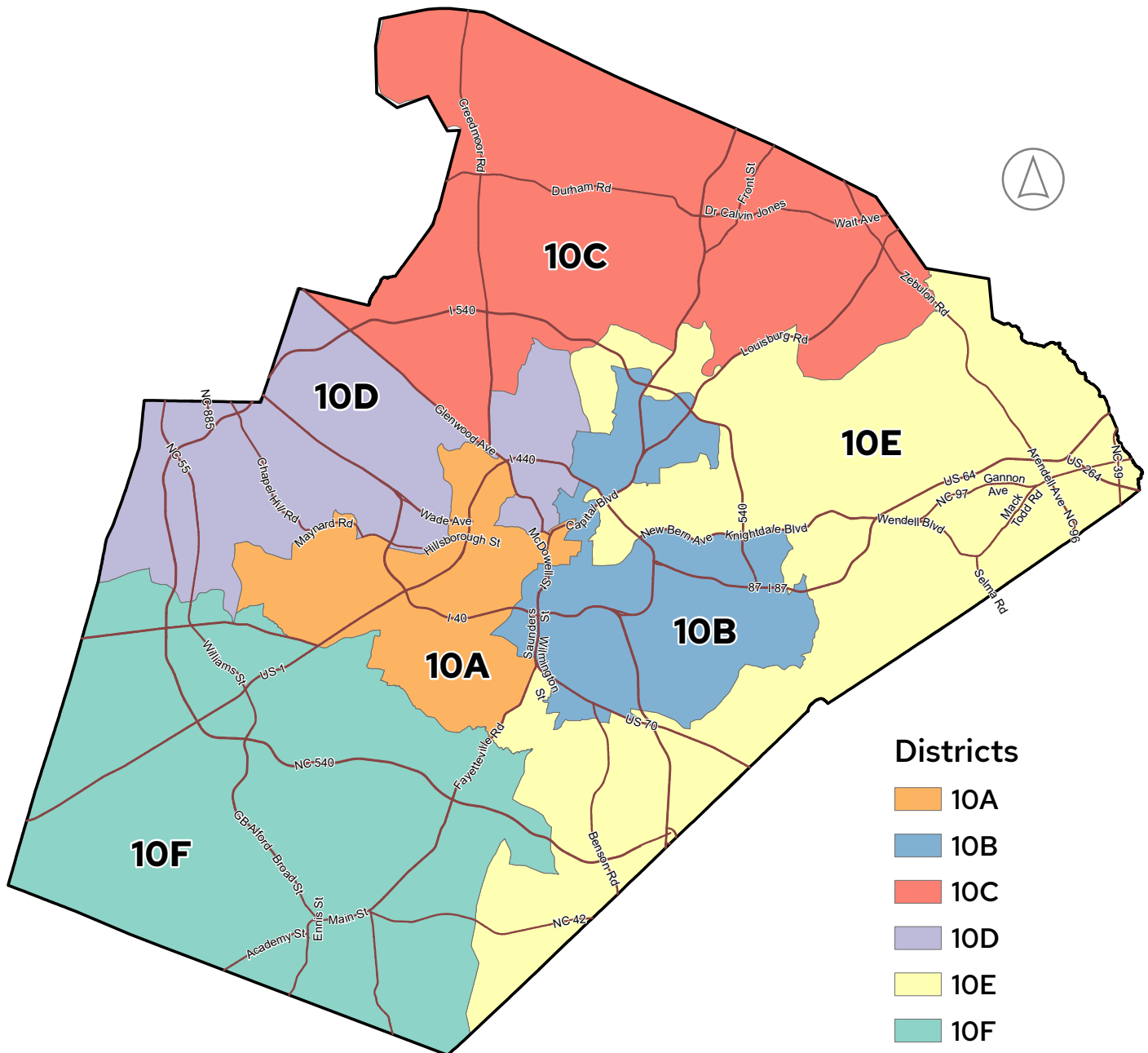

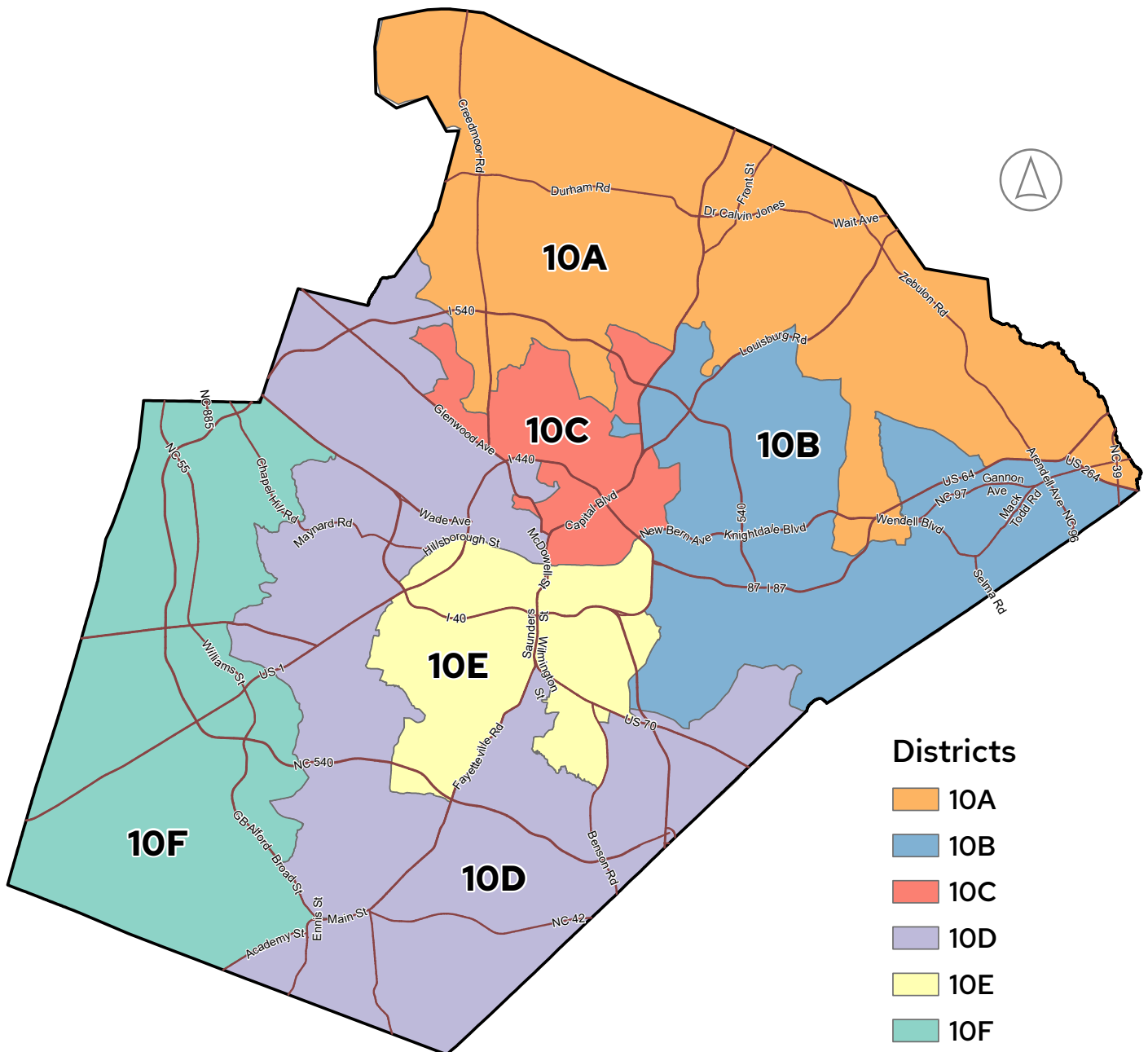

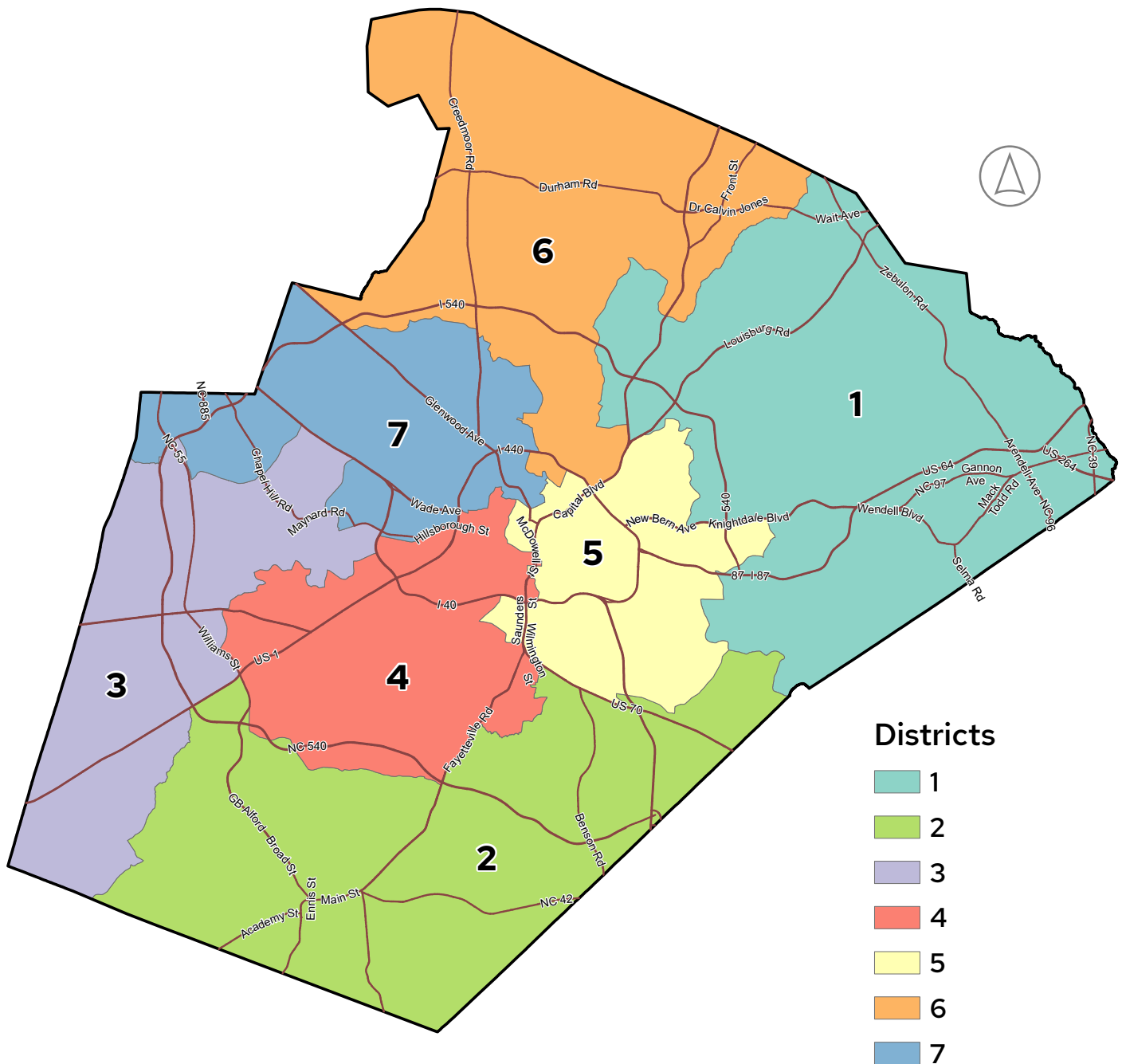

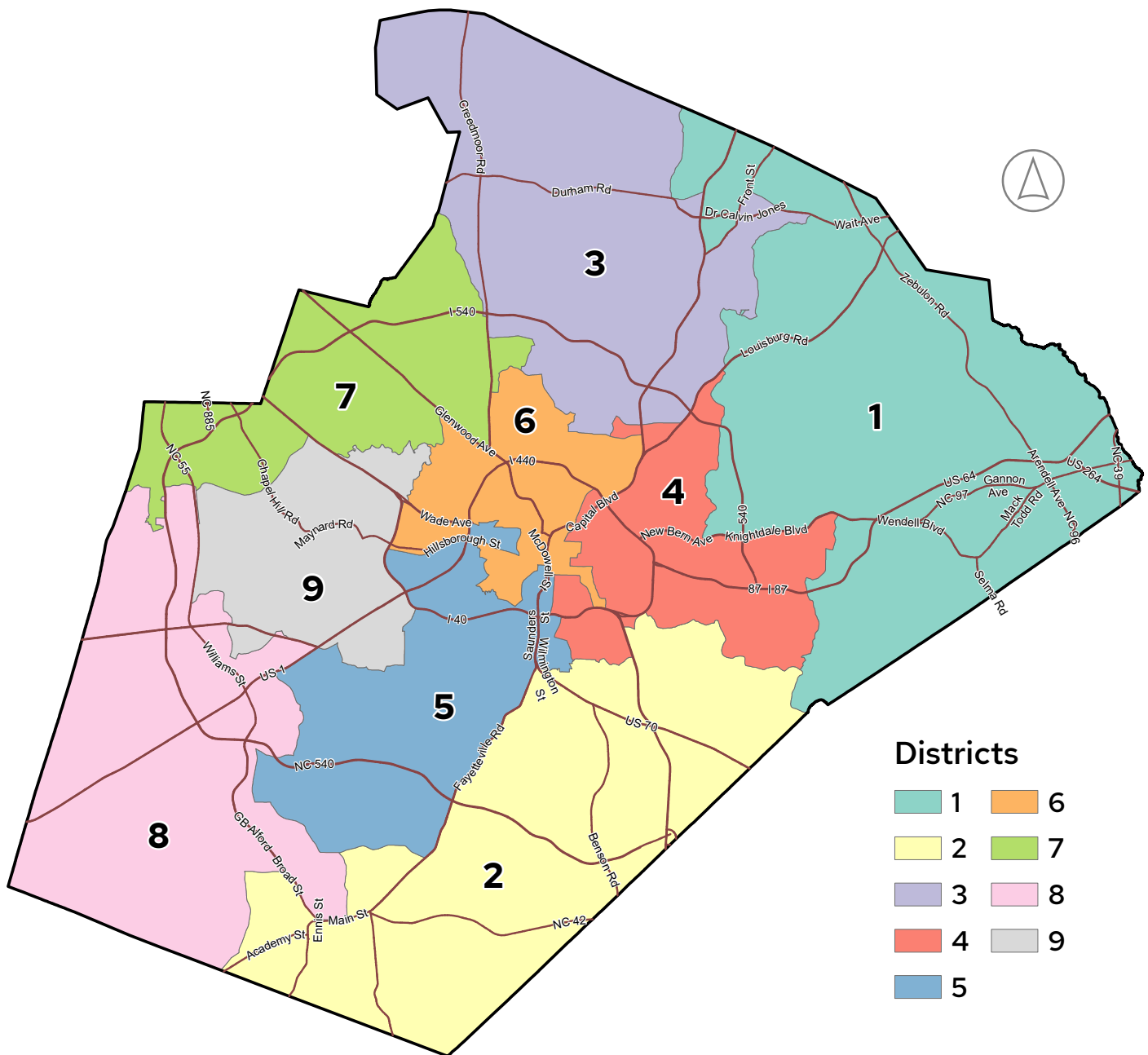

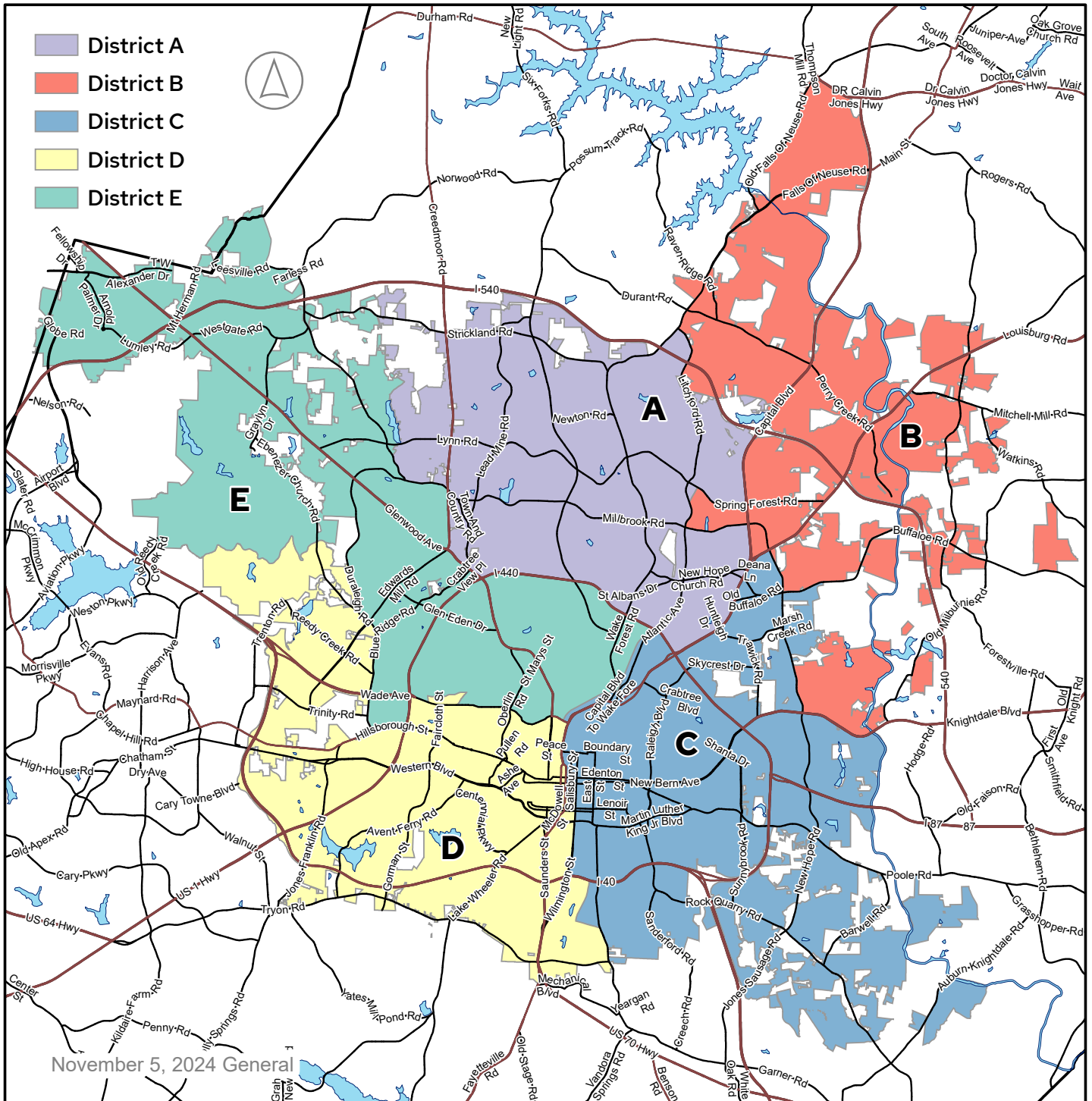

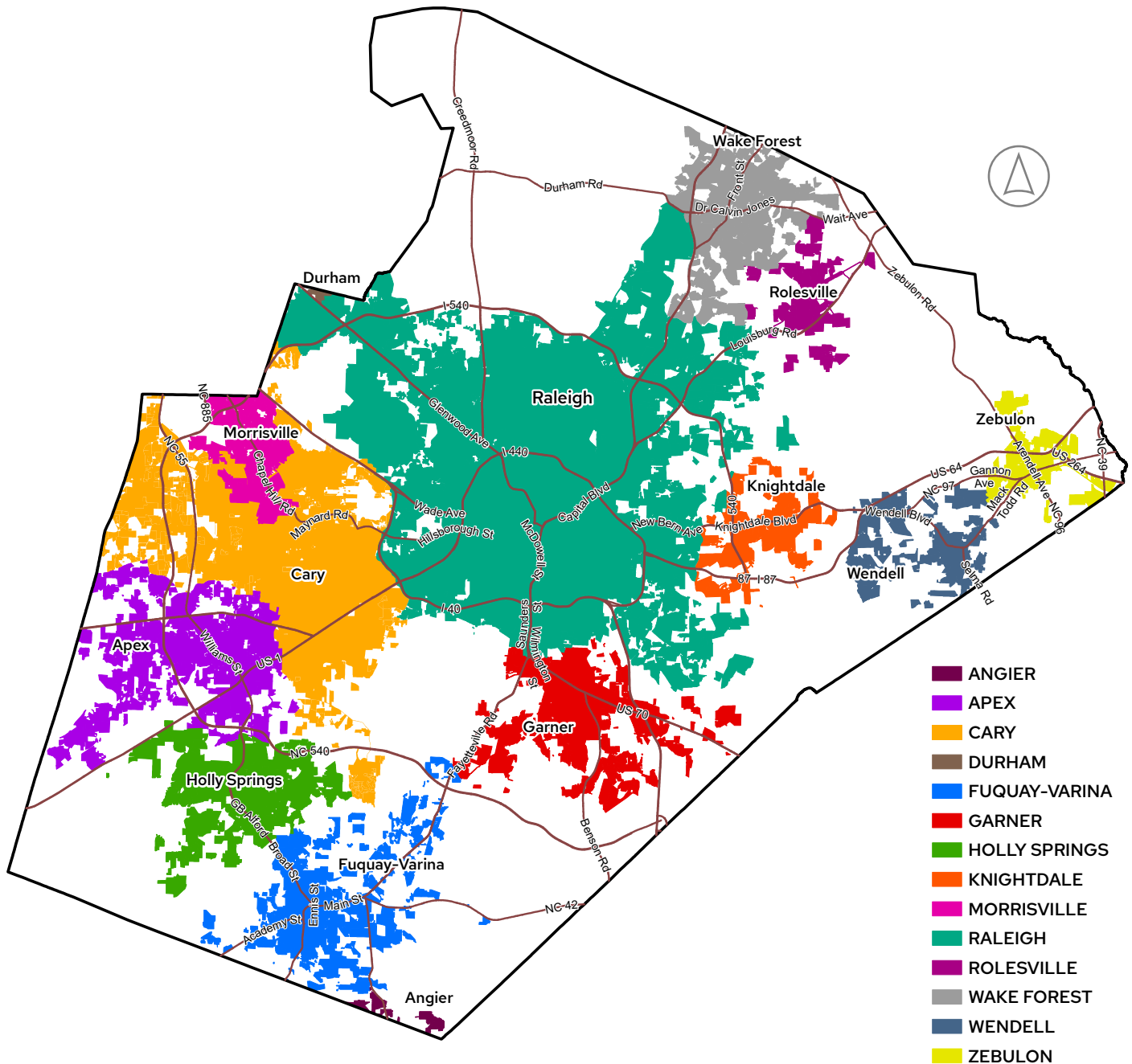

PLEASE READ THIS

What is the timeline for Election Night Unofficial Votes?

- ⌚ Typically, after the polls close at 7:30 p.m., you will see the first unofficial results posted online before 8 p.m. These returns are the absentee results.
- ⌚ At 7:30 p.m. officials will close the early voting polls at the Board of Elections Operations Center, which the public may observe. This process may take an hour or more, and results will be posted thereafter.
- ⌚ Any voter in line at an Election Day polling place by 7:30 p.m. will be allowed to vote before officials may begin auditing and inventorying all items as they close the polling place. Tabulators must then be delivered to the Board of Elections before results can be uploaded to the NCSBE Results Dashboard. This entire process can take 3-4 hours.
- ⌚ It is anticipated that the first returns from the Election Day precincts should be posted at approximately 10 p.m. Depending on the length of a line at 7:30 p.m. and distance from the Board of Elections, it may take an hour or more after 10 p.m. for all tabulators to be returned and for the unofficial results to be posted.
- ⌚ With Wake County having the most precincts, highest voter population, and highest average turnout in North Carolina, the volume of work on election night can cause delays, both in the closing of polls and in the reporting software.
- ⌚ In summary, our target goal is to have all unofficial results reported online by 11 p.m.

- ⌚ The deadline to REQUEST an absentee ballot is Tuesday, October 29 by 5 p.m.
- ⌚ The deadline to DELIVER an absentee ballot to the Board of Elections Operations Center is Tuesday, November 5 by 7:30 p.m.
- ⌚ A postmark does NOT establish timely delivery of a ballot and there will NOT be a grace period to receive ballots by mail.

10 FACTS ELECTION SECURITY IN NORTH CAROLINA

01.



No Successful Attacks

No election system or voting system in the state has ever been the target of a successful cyberattack.

02.



Paper Ballots

Under state law, all counties use paper ballots, producing a paper trail that can be easily audited or recounted.

03.



Voter Photo ID

All voters are asked to show [photo ID](#) when they check in to vote. This verifies the person wishing to vote is the registered voter on the registration rolls.

04.



Partnerships

Elections officials work with federal and state governments, who assist with [cybersecurity](#), plan for election events, and respond to incidents.

05.



No Internet or Modems

By state law, voting machines may not be connected to the internet, limiting possible cyber interference. No NC voting machine contains a modem or modem chip.

06.



Bipartisan, Trained Officials

Every polling place is staffed with bipartisan, trained officials from the local community who take an oath to uphold state elections laws.

07.



Voting Equipment Testing

Before every election, the county boards of elections test every [voting machine](#) that will be used to ensure proper configuration of ballots and accurate counting of votes for every contest.

08.



Investigations Division

NC is one of few states with a dedicated [Investigations Division](#), staffed by experienced professionals who investigate reports of fraud and other irregularities and refer substantiated cases to prosecutors.

09.



Post-Election Audits

After every election and before results are certified, election officials [conduct audits](#) designed to detect irregularities and ensure voting machines accurately counted the results.

10.



Certified Voting Systems

All [voting systems](#) used in North Carolina meet federal regulations and are certified by the State Board of Elections after extensive testing and public demonstrations and must be approved by county officials before purchase.

Voters should always get election information from trusted sources, particularly elections officials, and verify information about elections before sharing it on social media. For accurate, up-to-date election information, visit www.ncsbe.gov.

Results & Recounts

When will election results be available?

- Election night results are UNOFFICIAL.
 - Media may observe tabulation of absentee and early voting unofficial results on Nov. 5 at 1200 N New Hope Rd.
 - At the close of polls, media may observe tabulation of Election Day polling place unofficial results at that polling place.
 - County boards of elections will meet at 11 a.m. on Nov. 15 to certify the results.
 - The State Board of Elections will meet at 11 a.m on Nov. 26 to certify results statewide.
 - Barring recounts or election protests, counties will sort results by precinct 30 days after Election Day.
- ✔ If needed, recounts will be conducted at a public Board meeting to be determined.
 - ✔ Presidential Elector & Electoral College information can be found at ncsbe.gov.
